In 1975, a small group of concerned citizens explored the need for services for women who had a loved one in prison; resulted in the formation of a Board of Directors in February of 1976 called Women in Crisis. The Agency incorporated in 1979 as a private not for profit and tax exempt organization. In 1985, the Agency changed its name to Families in Crisis, Inc. to better identify the population served. Families In Crisis focuses on the dynamics of the family unit and the significant role that these relationships play in helping offenders and their families rebuild their lives. FIC's services are an important addition to the criminal justice system's efforts to reduce recidivism and to prepare offenders to be productive members of their families and communities.
